I refer to the request, received 12th March, which you have made under the Freedom of Information Act 2014 for access to records held by this Department, as follows:

1. Details of all expenditure by deputy John Deasy in his role as Special Envoy to the US since he was appointed to the role

Since his appointment as Special Envoy to the United States Congress in June 2017, Deputy Deasy has worked on issues relating to the undocumented Irish in the US, and on progressing the E3 visa bill to secure future pathways for Irish to travel to the US. Deputy Deasy has been supported, from a logistical perspective, by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. The staff resources required have been drawn from existing resources in relevant sections of the Department, as needed and on a case by case basis. Deputy Deasy has been, in particular, supported by the US & Canada Unit of this Department and by the Embassy of Ireland in Washington, D.C. Likewise, Deputy Deasy's travel and subsistence expenses have been covered from within the existing resources of the Department, as and when he has undertaken activities in connection with his role as Special Envoy.
